JEREMIAH 33

From the back of the van we heard a voice, “Here, give this to him!” My husband received the gift and looking in the rear-view mirror, asked, “Are you sure?”

“Yes.” Came the not so loud reply. So out the window went the 5 dollars. We each realized the much-needed gift was just given away and our hearts grew pensive. After several seconds of silence our daughter stated, “You told Pap-pap you needed that, and you gave it away?”

“Yes,” Came his reply, “he needs it more.”

In Jeremiah 33:3, the Lord is talking to Jeremiah, “Ask me and I will tell you remarkable secrets you do not now about things to come.”

I can ask anything? “Oh, thank you Jesus! This is just what I needed!” One of the greatest joys of serving Jesus is the developing relationship between He and I. I am amazed how personal and intimate He longs to be. He desires for us to ask Him anything. He desires for us to come into His presence. He loves an inquisitive being seeking Him. I will cleanse Jerusalem of their sins.

I will forgive all their sins of rebellion.

This city will bring me joy, glory and honor.

I will show my Goodness.

I will bring life to the streets and towns.

I will bring joy and laughter.

I will bring back the joyful voices of bridegrooms and brides.

I will bring back songs and thanksgiving offerings to the Lord.

I will restore prosperity to the land. There will be pastures and shepherds.

I will raise a Righteous Descendant from David's line. (Promise of the Messiah)

Judah will be saved.

Jerusalem will live in safety.

Jerusalem's name will be, The Lord is Our Righteousness.

David's descendants will sit on the throne forever.

Levitical priest will always be present to offer offerings and sacrifices.

My covenant will never be broken.

David's descendants and the Levitical ministers will be multiplied.

I will never abandon you.

I will restore your land and have mercy on you.

Amazing Promises! What great love! What could be more redemptive! At this time in Jeremiah's life, I am uncertain if Jeremiah could see the promises for restoration.
